# Pastor's Piece

What's your family tradition for exchanging Christmas gifts? My family usually exchanges one or two "big" gifts on Christmas. I think my wife is the best gift-giver. I think she knows exactly what each family member needs or wants to have. My family is always happy with her gift because she gives us what we like.

Who is the best gift-giver in your family? I think to be a good gift-giver you need to know what other people need or want. But sometimes we give gifts "in reverse." I mean we give gifts that we want to have and not what they want to have.

There is a story in the gospel of Matthew 2 about a group of people who bring gifts to a newborn King. These people are called the 'Magi' or 'Wise Men' who set out a long journey when they saw the star rising in East. These are the perfect gifts for the newborn king because they emphasized the importance of Jesus as the King and Messiah. 

JANUARY 24 | *The Prodigal Prophet: Jonah and the Mystery of God's Mercy* | by Timothy Keller | 270 pgs | \$11 | The story of Jonah is one of the most well-known but most misunderstood parables in the Bible. In *The Prodigal Prophet*, pastor and New York Times bestselling author Timothy Keller reveals the hidden depths within the book of Jonah. Keller makes the case that Jonah was one of the worst prophets in the entire Bible. And yet there are unmistakably clear connections between Jonah, the prodigal son, and Jesus. Keller provides an answer to the extraordinary conclusion of this biblical parable—and shares the powerful Christian message at the heart of Jonah's story.

**FEBRUARY 28 |** *That's Why I Hate Green Beans* | By Lincee Rice | 208 pages | \$1.00 | If there is one thing Lincee Ray has learned over the years, it's that the majority of women on the planet struggle with insecurities. Our skinny jeans mock us. Our just-trying-to-help mothers are just driving us crazy. Our social media feeds taunt us with everyone else's picture-perfect lives. It's enough to send you on a gummy-bear bender while binge-watching *Friends* reruns and not showering for a week. Lincee knows. She's been there. Right there, in fact. Gummy bears and all. For every woman who's ever wondered if she's unlovable, uninteresting, or unattractive, Lincee offers her particular brand of hilarious (and hard-hitting) self-reflection. Like a true friend, she shows us that the fastest way to happiness is to embrace ourselves in all our imperfection, trust that God knew what he was doing when he made us, and maybe go buy a new tube of mascara. Walk alongside Lincee as she discovers that her identity is not found in her job, her relationship status, her bank account, or her social circle. It's found in Christ.

MARCH 27 | *Rosemary: The Hidden Kennedy Daughter* | By Kate Clifford Larson | 336 pages | \$5.00 Joe and Rose Kennedy's strikingly beautiful daughter Rosemary was intellectually disabled, a secret fiercely guarded by her powerful and glamorous family. In Rosemary, Kate Clifford Larson uses newly uncovered sources to bring Rosemary Kennedy's story to light. Young Rosemary comes alive as a sweet, lively girl adored by her siblings. But Larson also reveals the often desperate and duplicitous arrangements the Kennedys made to keep her away from home as she became increasingly difficult in her early twenties, culminating in Joe's decision to have Rosemary lobotomized at age twenty-three and the family's complicity in keeping the secret. Only years later did the Kennedy siblings begin to understand what had happened to Rosemary, which inspired them to direct government attention and resources to the plight of the developmentally and mentally disabled, transforming the lives of millions.

APRIL 24 | Forgiving My Daughter's Killer: A True Story of Loss, Faith, and Unexpected Grace | By Kate Grosmaire, Nancy French | 256 pages | \$1.00 | Is it really possible to forgive the unthinkable? In 2010, Kate and Andy Grosmaire made national headlines when they did just that---publicly extending mercy to the man who shot their 19-year-old daughter. Recounting the tragedy, the trial, and the events that followed, Kate describes with breathtaking grace how Jesus helped them show love to an enemy. 256 pages, hardcover from Nelson.
