Pastor's Piece

I sometimes go to a fast-food restaurant – McDonalds or Wendy's or Burger King – to get a quick lunch. All fast-food restaurants have some special menus for children and they usually call them "Happy Meal." I think someone who invented Happy Meal for children was so brilliant. I look around at the people, especially children, at the restaurants and see them very happy to have a Happy Meal because it usually has children's favorite meal, drink, a toy, and some puzzles on the bag.

I thought to myself if we made a Happy Meal for adults what do you think we should include in the package? What do you think makes you happy? Think about that for a moment. To me I would be really happy if my burger is big and delicious and there is lots of fries. But I realize that 15 minutes of eating the meal the happy feeling would not last long. Then I find myself spending hours looking for happiness in other places. Where do you find your happiness?

The psalmist tells us where we can find real happiness. Psalm 1:1-3 says, "Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers; but his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night." Basically, what that means is you will find happiness if you delight in the law of the Lord. Someone who delights, someone who is happy, someone who is joyful, he or she finds blessing, he or she finds happiness in the Word of God. The Psalmist continues to say, "On his law they meditate day and night." We meditate on God, the goodness of God, the character of God, the faithfulness of God, the love of God, things that He has done to us, He has showed to us, the way God showed His love for us. Not only on Sunday but every day we meditate on it. "Hmmm, thank you Lord." There we find happiness.

Then verse three shows happy people do not depend on circumstance. It says, "They are like trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season, and their leaves do not wither. In all that they do, they prosper." This tree is planted by water so during hot and dry seasons like this summer, this particular tree will bear much fruit and prosper. Why? Because this tree has access to the source of living water. And the living water for Christians is our faith in God.

Friends, we will go through different seasons of life. Sometimes we go through the season of spring, sometimes we go through season of summer, fall, and winter.

Every one of us is subject to seasons. But those who believe in Jesus, those who love God, those who put their trust in Him, will prosper, their life will never be shaken, they will find happiness wherever they go.

I hope we will be like a tree, the tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither. Whatever he or she does prospers." That's the happy person. Grace and Peace,

HOW CAN I HELP WHEN DISASTER STRIKES?

When disaster strikes anywhere in the world, many United Methodists want to know how they can help.

The simplest answer is to go to https://www.umcmission.org. If there is a disaster of significant magnitude, United Methodist Global Ministries will place a link at the top of the page to donate to either the U.S. or International Disaster Response and Recovery fund, depending on where the disaster occurs.

By streamlining these disaster response funds into these two accounts, Global Ministries' United Methodist Committee on Relief is best positioned to offer the right support, in the right way, at the right time.

Giving money may seem impersonal. But when disaster strikes, whether natural or human-caused, funding is by far the most valuable, flexible, and useful resource to have on hand.

Some people want to do more. They may want to donate items or go and volunteer to help.

While these impulses are understandable and laudable, sending things not specifically requested does not help. And going into a disaster zone without the training and proper supervision to handle the situation at hand can slow down the needed work or endanger those who go and others also.

For US-related disasters, you can always send kits for basic relief to UMCOR's Sager-Brown Depot. When you do, be sure to follow the directions for each kit exactly so all kits are as identical as possible. This will help expedite their shipping to people in need in the US. UMCOR does not ship these kits for disasters outside the US.

Through UMCOR, United Methodists have one of the most effective, globally deployed relief networks on the planet. UMCOR and its partner, United Methodist Volunteers In Mission (UMVIM), have trained thousands of volunteers for specific kinds of assistance. In cooperation with annual conference disaster response coordinators, UMVIM in each conference can deploy these trained volunteers where needed, especially within the United States.

After you have checked the Global Ministries website and donated money and/or supplies to UMCOR, keep checking with your annual conference disaster response website over the following weeks and months to learn when and what kind of volunteers or additional items may be needed. Just keep in mind UMCOR does not send volunteers across international borders.

To summarize, here are three simple rules.

1. Do no harm.

a. Do not self-deploy or organize your own group trips to a disaster site, and do not send anything not specifically requested by UMCOR or other experienced relief organizations on the ground.

2. Do good.

- a. Give to UMCOR's relief funds or relief kits, knowing that UMCOR will make the best use of them with trusted partners on the ground.
- b. Go as a volunteer within your own country when your training and expertise match the request from your conference disaster coordinator.

3. Attend upon all the ordinances of God.

- a. Pray for those who have been impacted and for those who are on the ground to rescue, clear debris, and assess next steps.
- b. Fast, and donate what you would have spent on food for the meals you skipped to UMCOR.
- c. Search the scriptures to see how God has provided for people facing disaster.
- d. Engage in holy conferencing with others in your congregation and community about ways to respond to the current disaster and to improve your readiness for those that will come.

In these ways you can know what you want to offer when disaster strikes really helps when and where it's needed most.

September 27, 2023 Pachinko | by Min Jin Lee | 479 pgs | \$6 Among New York Times Top Ten Books of the Year and National Book Award finalist, this novel details the four generations of an immigrant family as they fight to control their destiny in 20th-century Japan. When teenaged Sunja discovers she is pregnant—and her lover is married—she accepts an offer of marriage from a gentle, sickly minister passing through Korea on his way to Japan. But her decision sets off a dramatic saga that echoes through the generations. From bustling street markets to the halls of Japan's finest universities to the pachinko parlors of the criminal underworld, Lee's complex and passionate characters survive and thrive against the indifferent arc of history.


October 25, 2023 Together: The Healing Power of Human Connection in a Sometimes Lonely World | by Vivek H. Murthy | 352 pgs | \$10 In this groundbreaking book, the 19th surgeon general of the United States Dr. Vivek Murthy makes a case for loneliness as a public health concern: a root cause and contributor to many of the epidemics sweeping the world today– from alcohol and drug addiction to violence to depression and anxiety. Loneliness, he argues, is affecting not only our health, but also how our children experience school, how we perform in the workplace, and the sense of division and polarization in our society. His message underscores the importance of human connection, the hidden impact of loneliness on our health, and the social power of community.

November 15, 2023 Cousins: Connected through Slavery, a Black Woman and a White Woman Discover Their Past – and Each Other | by Betty Kilby Baldwin and Phoebe Kilby | 244 pgs | \$10 What happens when a White woman, Phoebe, contacts a Black woman, Betty, saying she suspects they are connected through slavery? Revealed to be cousins, they commit to a path of reconciliation. In alternating chapters, each tells her dramatic story, from Betty's experience as one of the first Black children to attend her desegregated school to Phoebe's eventual question to Betty: "How do I begin to repair the harms?" Piercingly honest, the book includes a working reparations project that the women conceived together.

December 20, 2023 The Prodigal Prophet: Jonah and the Mystery of God's Mercy | by Timothy Keller | 270 pgs | \$11 The story of Jonah is one of the most well-known but most misunderstood parables in the Bible. In *The Prodigal Prophet*, pastor and New York Times bestselling author Timothy Keller reveals the hidden depths within the book of Jonah. Keller makes the case that Jonah was one of the worst prophets in the entire Bible. And yet there are unmistakably clear connections between Jonah, the prodigal son, and Jesus. Keller provides an answer to the extraordinary conclusion of this biblical parable—and shares the powerful Christian message at the heart of Jonah's story.
